The program, now in a pilot phase with kids from 4-13, kicked off on July 24 at UofL Hospital, with younger children engaging in an anatomy lesson with play dough and older kids in an operating room where they handled surgery tools and learned about the many people and skills required to successfully perform an operation, with the focus always on the patient. A Questioning Frame of Mind

A commitment to being antiracist manifests in our choices. When we encounter interpersonal racism, whether obvious or covert, there are ways to respond and interrupt it. Asking questions is a powerful tool to seek clarity or offer a new perspective. Below are some suggestions to use in conversations when racist behavior occurs:

--offer an alternative perspective: "Have you ever considered _____?"

--seek clarity: "Tell me more about _____."

--speak your truth: "I don't see it the way you do. I see it as_____."

--find common ground: "We don't agree on _____, but we agree on _____."

--give yourself the time and space you need: "Could we revisit the conversation about ______ tomorrow?"

--set boundaries: "Please do not say _____ again to me or around me."

WRITE about an instance in which you might use one or more of these strategies.
